## **Complicated**



#### The free entitlement

- 1. Universal free entitlement (15 hours) all 3- & 4-year-olds
- Extended entitlement (+15 hours) for 3- & 4-year-olds in working families
- Means-tested early education (15 hours) 40% most disadvantaged 2-year-olds

#### Relief through the tax system

- 4. Employer-supported childcare (e.g. vouchers) tax & NICs
- 5. Tax-free childcare relief from basic-rate tax
- VAT exemptions for (some) childcare providers\*


#### Support from the benefits system

- 7. 70% reimbursement through legacy benefits
- 8. 85% reimbursement through Universal Credit


- At least 8 different programmes to support childcare

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## Real-terms spending on free entitlement in England



Part-time childcare prices for 0- and 1-year-olds



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
## Costly

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## Costly

- Most families pay nothing for pre-school childcare
- But a minority face very high costs

- Emphasis regularly shifts between 'early education' and 'childcare'
- Major shifts in targeting of spending over the last two decades (even as overall spending grew substantially)

# Tackling the 'three Cs'

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### **Complicated**

- New programmes aren't the only answer
- Effort also needed to maintain & strengthen existing programmes

#### Costly

- Huge diversity of experiences one size does not fit all
- Understanding financial pressures

#### **Constantly changing**

- Piecemeal reforms aren't a substitute for a long-term strategy
- What outcomes do we want our early years system to deliver? Why?
